# EDITORIAL SEPTEMBER 2020

Has anyone been to Kemble recently? This sleepy Cotswold hamlet was once home to the RAF Red Arrows display team, who were based there between 1968 and 1983. Since they moved out, the airfield has had a much quieter life, predominately catering for private flyers, no doubt lured by the large slices of cake served up at the local AV8 restaurant. However, in recent years Kemble has been home to an aircraft salvage company who are kept busy dismantling redundant airliners and selling off the valuable parts to keep similar aircraft flying. There's been a steady stream of aircraft coming in, and I'm always fascinated to see how these once-majestic machines are gradually reduced to their constituent parts before the remains are finally chopped up for scrap. If I'm up that way I'll try and spot any new arrivals. However I was unprepared for the sight that greeted me on my most recent visit when I found the airfield awash with Boeing 747s – Jumbo Jets. There was something slightly surreal about seeing these huge aircraft sitting amidst the Cotswold countryside, patiently awaiting their fate after being taken out of service due to the major downturn in the airline industry. From what I've read, few will return to service as passenger aircraft: they're now considered old technology and their running costs are far higher than modern aircraft. Some will be converted into freighters but others will be recycled. Such a sad end for something that (seemingly) not so long ago were instrumental in bringing cheap air travel to the masses. Go and take a look. I'm sure you'll be impressed by the spectacle.

# Badminton Memorial Hall Centenary

**1920 – 2020** The History and Development of the Village Hall – Part Three

#### Notes from the archives:

By September 1976 the hall floor had been resurfaced with polyurethane and the Badminton Court lines re-whitened. A purchase of 125 stacking chairs now replaces the old wooden benches around the side of the hall to make it look more modern and comfortable. Fund raising efforts increase to help fund the cost of the chairs and the final phase of the extension.

March 1977: The newly built extension is coming more into use but work is far from completed and more help is needed with painting and decorating. Showers not yet installed. A floor will be put over what was the Clinic Room and a staircase put in to create a new Committee Room. Outline planning has been obtained for the building of a outdoor swimming pool. (which was never built)

The bar room/meeting room was named 'The Jubilee Room' in honour of it being the Queen's Silver Jubilee Year. That room became very useful for clubs etc who didn't need the space of the main hall. It was used by the Valentine Club from 1980 as a meeting room; for crib, whist drives, cricket teas; as a coffee/tea room during fetes, bazaars and jumble sales. The room was a great asset to the hall.

The hall had been used for many years by the Royal British Legion for their Flower and Veg shows. This will be fully reported at a later date.

The large upstairs rooms were used for a time as a Youth Club, now that area is used for the private owned Pumpkins Nursery.

In 1977 there was an opening ceremony for the new extension but no report has been found as yet. In 1978 The new Committee Room was finished, and was also used as a changing room for some of the music bands that played there.

#### MEMORIAL HALL CENTENARY cont...

Sport played a big part on the sport field of the hall, with Badminton having Football and Cricket teams for many years. The then Marquis of Worcester, Harry Somerset, brought along his team, which included at times the famous Imran Khan, to play against the Badminton team. The Lord's Taverners Charity Cricket team played against a team of celebrities and County players. Also, the London New Zealand cricket team came quite often to play against the Badminton Team. Sadly, now the village does not have its own football or cricket teams due to lack of available players. There were also youth football and cricket teams at one time.

The Badminton Court in the main hall has been well used over the years by small groups, and still would be now if we were not in 'lockdown' due to the Covid 19 virus.

For over 25 years the Valentine Club hosted Senior Citizens Christmas parties in the hall where they were entertained by a variety of musicians and other groups, especially the very talented Hawkesbury Players.

#### 2003 FIRE

The Memorial Hall suffered a disaster in the early hours of Wednesday 21<sup>st</sup> May when a fire started in the area of the stage. Two appliances from Yate Fire Brigade attended and found a quarter of the hall alight. They called for additional help which came from Tetbury and Nailsworth in Gloucestershire and Chippenham in Wiltshire. A total of six engines attended and continued damping down until after 7am. The main fire was in and around the stage end of the building where the heating boiler was located and the area suffered a badly damaged roof as did the kitchen area. The extension including the Jubilee Room sustained less damage. Many records of the history including the minutes books, and a record collection that was used in earlier years for the youth club were destroyed. Also lost were the plaques with the names of the local men lost in the two wars. The roof was repaired and the ceiling area of the hall much improved from the original. The hall and kitchen were renovated, the stage rebuilt and new Memorial Plagues made.

We are lucky to have such good facilities as there are at Badminton Hall. The main hall is a very good size and the stage area must be one of the best that you would find in a village hall. The Jubilee Room is a decent size for the use of clubs and things like whist drives and is available to hire along with the main hall or separately, with or without the bar open. (obviously when the current situation allows)

An important thing to remember, especially as we have just past the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of World War Two, is that Badminton Memorial Hall exists as 'The Memorial' to those local men who lost their lives in the two World Wars

### THE RICHARD SMITH STORY

"A Farmer and a Sportsman" By Ray Bird, Acton Turville

#### PART 1 - The Early Days.

I want to start this article by thanking Richard and his wife Jenny for not only their co-operation in answering so many questions, but for allowing me access to Richard's personal scrapbook of not just photos of his sporting career, but also some fascinating personal related material.

Rather ironically, I had gone to him for information on another article I had started working on for a future LTB, that being on the history of the Beaufort Hunt Point-Point races of which Richard had ridden in. However, once I started looking through his memorabilia, it was obvious that his life of sporting achievements warranted a story of its own. Also, if I was allowed to re-produce some of those personal sport related items (Richard duly agreed I could), it really would be a sort of first for LTB, in being able to get a glimpse of items that the public would not normally have access too, in what one might call a look 'behind the scenes'.

To most LTB readers, Richard is the farmer at New House Farm where there is usually a lot of horses in the fields wearing fancy light fly protecting rugs and hoods in summer, and warm clothing in winter, but what many people are not aware of is that Richard was once one of the country's top National Hunt jockeys who rode over 120 winners, and that his achievements included being champion amateur jockey.

Unfortunately, shortly after turning professional his racing career as a jockey was ended prematurely following a serious fall in a race at Newton Abbot, without that, he would surely have gone on to achieve even greater success.

Let us though go back to the beginning. Coming from a farming and horsey family Richard learned to ride at an early age, and with his parents being keen hunting people he was soon joining them in the field on his pony and learning the basics of jumping hedges and galloping over grassland, skills that in later years would play such an important part in his career.

With his father, sister and brother having all ridden in Point-Point races, it was no surprise that he would follow suit, and in 1966, aged 18, he got his first Point-Point ride on a horse called Uncle Charlie at Chewton Mendip racecourse. Richard takes up the story of that first ride - "The horse was owned by Uncle Tom Smith of Cape Farm, Badminton, and was one he rode a lot out hunting. Being my first ride I was rather apprehensive, but he jumped well enough, but being more of a plodder we gradually got tailed off and so in the end I pulled him up, it had though been a good first experience".

Following a few quiet years on the Point-Point circuit with only placed success, the 1969-70 season saw Richard get his first ride under National Hunt rules in a race at Chepstow for local trainer Taffy Jenkins, some readers will remember he had his stables at Lyegrove. "It was not the best of starts to my N.H racing career" Richard recalled, "for although it jumped well for much of the race in the end it fell".

Later that season though he was to have more luck, when at Newton Abbott he scored his first victory under N.H rules riding a horse called Hope Again. Richard again takes up the story - "I felt very proud just to be asked to ride it, for its owner and trainer Denis Windle was a highly respected man in the world of racing, and an accomplished jockey having ridden the horse himself to numerous Point-Point victories, and so to win for him was an added bonus".

It was Hope Again that in the 1970-71 season was again to be a special star for Richard when it gave him one of his most memorable victories, winning what is regarded has the most prestigious National Hunt race for amateur riders, the Foxhunters Chase at the Cheltenham Festival. Richard remembers that race well - "being a good jumper and stayer he was what us jockeys would call an easy mount, and I had a

wonderful ride and coming up that famous Cheltenham hill to the winning post to the cheers of a packed grandstand was unbelievable. Given I had rode him at Didmarton Point-Point just a week or so before, where although winning he had had a hard race, it made the Cheltenham victory against some of best hunter chasers in Britain & Ireland all the more remarkable". During that summer of 1971 Richard also enjoyed taking part in a few flat races, including one on a horse called Kings Pastime at Haydock that was owned by the well-known singer Frankie Vaughan. Although that one was unplaced, Richard did have a third place in a race at Epsom.

# J J'S GARDENING BLOG



I shall start with a lovely rose I saw recently, the name is rather a mouthful but here goes: Ghislaine de Feligonole, flowers in clusters of peachy shades. It has a rather 1920's feel about it, think chiffon dresses...

#### Tips of the Month

Vegetables have a good flavour and are much quicker to cook if they are gathered when on the slim side. Runner beans particularly. If you only have a small number of plants, pick a few daily and after three days you will have enough to eat. Beetroot, harvest when they are between the size of a golf ball and a tennis ball. Things which win prizes at the village show are not tasty, they are prized for the achievement of growing something enormous. Large vegetables taste WOODY.

#### Jobs for this Month

Prune evergreens now, but check that no birds are in residence first. Water trees or large shrubs in a circle larger than if the tree were in a pot, this encourages the roots to spread out and explore. Tomato plants should have the top tip removed when five trusses have been produced, and start to remove or cut the leaves in half, this lets in the light and the energy to go into producing the fruit, or you may miss the boat. I don't want to sound too depressing, but the daylight is shortening, so time for things to be ready to eat is less.

#### Choosing Plants for the Garden

If you have gladioli, when they have died down completely, dig them up and remove all the baby corms clinging around the edges of the original plant and dispose of them. There is no point thinking they will extend your collection, they probably will in five years' time when they will have become big and strong. And keep the original corms in a dry place to replant next season to give a good show or to use as a cut flower.

#### Places to Visit

A really lovely garden to visit just now, and full of ideas is Bourton Court near Moreton in Marsh. Privately owned, no special timed entries, light lunches in the barn. Don't be put off if there are lots of cars parked there, there is plenty of room.

#### September 2020 Letter from the Vicar

Dear Parishioners,

It has now been six months since we went into lockdown. And I expect some people are wondering whether life will ever be the same again. One biblical analogy of this situation are the numerous sieges of cities that took place in the OLD TESTAMENT. It was a tried and tested method of victory, of starving a city into submission but it took time and patience.

When King Ahab was besieged in Jerusalem (2 Kings 16) by the kings of Syria and Israel (at this time Jerusalem was part of Judah, not Israel) Ahab managed to survive and then get word out to Tiglathpileser, the King of the Assyrians, to whom he sent silver and gold, and who in turn came to their rescue by destroying Damascus.

Obviously a siege is only similar to our current situation in that some people have been unable to leave their homes. And at least we have food and drink. But it does make one realise that these things happen sometimes but **do not last forever**.

I think one of the worst most worrying things is the loss of employment for many people. Inevitably that causes suffering and distress. There are not many sectors of society that will be affected by the pandemic. My two older sons are in their twenties and have both lost their jobs. But as the story above reminds us, these things do not last for ever and the pandemic will come to an end.

We perhaps need the spirit of Advent, the spirit of waiting. Patience and appreciating the gift of rest is something that for many is at least some blessing.
