## **EDITORIAL APRIL 2024**

If you're just about to eagerly scrutinise this month's edition of Local Talk Back to spot our hilarious 2024 April Fools' prank, I can save you the effort. There isn't one. It's definitely something the editorial team have discussed over the years, but when push comes to shove the risk of the joke back-firing has brought us to our senses and we've quickly shredded the idea. One that sticks in my mind was inspired by a chap called Josh Harris who ran the length of the River Avon from its source in Acton Turville to the point where it joins the Bristol Channel at Avonmouth. He was raising money for the Beaver Trust, an organisation which is keen to see beavers released into the wild where they can help regenerate landscapes and improve the quality of waterways. We thought it would be amusing to reveal that a colony of beavers had been established locally at an unidentified location, and had already been spotted building dams and creating new wetlands in which it was hoped they'd thrive. It was fun producing the article, but rather wisely we wondered what would happen if someone's pet went missing, or landowners started reporting increased levels of flooding, and it all got blamed on the mythical beaver colony. We really didn't fancy having the ensuing conversations.

Looking back, the earliest example of an April Fools' prank I can remember was shown on the BBC Panorama programme back in 1957, when a deadpan Richard Dimbleby travelled to Switzerland to report on the bountiful crop of spaghetti they were experiencing. The camera panned along rows and rows of spaghetti trees, and as viewers watched workers carefully harvested long strings of the stuff, Dimbleby explained the ins and outs of spaghetti farming, including the science behind getting the spaghetti to grow to a uniform length and the ever-present threat of the notorious spaghetti weevil. The piece was undoubtedly all the more convincing because Richard Dimbleby was a well-respected journalist who just a decade or so earlier had been the BBC's first war correspondent, reporting on some of the most significant events of the Second World War. It probably helped that in the 1950s, spaghetti was still something of a novelty, one that came in tins with a rich tomato sauce. Viewers were apparently most put out to learn that most of it came not from the foothills of a mountain in Switzerland but from a factory in St Albans.

The spaghetti prank stands the test of time. It has all the key ingredients to make it credible and it was produced by the BBC which was an organisation that viewers trusted implicitly. It was also one of the first examples of an April Fools' prank delivered by a national broadcaster in Britain so viewers were not expecting it. Fast forward 65-odd years and the media will be full of pranks come the 1<sup>st</sup> April with everyone from the weatherman to celebrity chefs getting in on the act, but of course the viewers, listeners and readers will be wise to it and won't be so easily taken in. Will they?

On the subject of the media, if you haven't done so already, please take the time to read this month's Vicar's Letter. Our vicar is rightly aggrieved that some sections of the national media are spinning stories about the church which he argues are blatantly untrue, supported by data which is incorrect. His bottom line is "don't believe what you read", or at least take it with a large pinch of salt. Richard's letter is very timely, coming so soon after the press launched into an unsightly feeding frenzy when pictures of the Princess of Wales and her young family were found to be doctored, only for the editors to be served large portions of humble pie when the real reason for the changes became apparent and their fanciful stories proved unfounded. Don't let the facts get in the way of a good story as they say, because it's good stories that sell newspapers, not facts.

Elsewhere in this month's Talk Back you'll see that the events pages are filling up. It's apparently Spring, although from where I'm sitting that statement has all the hallmarks of an April Fools' prank. Coming up in April we have the first of the Badminton House open gardens events of 2024, then towards the end of the month there's something new in the form of a guided tour around the woodlands of Badminton Estate followed by a visit to Worcester Lodge which should be quite special. Also taking place towards the end of April is the ANZAC Day parade at Leighterton, where the 23 pilots of the Australian Flying Corps who are buried in the cemetery on the edge of the village will be remembered. They died between 1918 and 1919, learning to fly at the nearby airfield which was set up by the Australians during the latter stages of the First World War. The ANZAC Day event, organised by the local Branch of the Royal British Legion, is always well attended so if you plan to attend, we recommend getting there early. If you can't make it, find time to visit the cemetery and pay your respects. It's well worth it, and slightly surreal to see the immaculate rows of headstones in such a peaceful Cotswold setting.



# THE ROYAL BRITISH LEGION LEIGHTERTON ANZAC DAY EVENT SUNDAY 28 APRIL

Towards the end of the First World War, on the outskirts of the small village of Leighterton, the Australian Flying Corps established a military airfield to train pilots before they were sent to France for combat. Flying at that time was a highly dangerous business, and sadly 23 pilots were killed during training. These pilots are buried together at Leighterton in Commonwealth War Graves.

Every year, on the Sunday nearest to ANZAC Day, a memorial service is held at Leighterton cemetery, organized by the Royal British Legion.

Representatives from the Australian and New Zealand High Commission are normally there and the service is well attended.

This year the service is on 28 April at 3.00 p.m. Anyone wishing to attend should allow ample time and be in the cemetery by 2.45.

It's November 1977 and John Davis reports on activities at the recently-extended Badminton Village Hall prior to its grand re-opening.

#### VILLAGE HALL NOTES

The winter activities are now underway, and the Hall as usual, is in great demand. Functions at present arranged include a Dance on November 4th (in conjunction with the P.T.A.); Christmas Bazaar on Sat 26th November; and we are hopeful that we can arrange a film show evening, possibly sometime in January, to include films taken at the Jubilee Sports Day.

Has anyone got one or two easy chairs that they are anxious to get rid of? We need quite a few television type chairs (that is small compact easy chairs) for furnishing the new television lounge. I would be pleased to hear from anyone who feels they could denate such a chair, or sell at a reasonable figure.

Now that the dark evenings have arrived we are hoping to restart our voluntary work at the Hall to finish off the extension, and to continue with the construction of the Committee Room and the minor improvements needed to the stage. The work in the extension is nearly all straight forward decorating, and the kitchen also needs its final decorations. The new Committee Room has yet to be constructed over what was the old clinic room, and it When all this is hoped to get this completed during the winter. work has been done, it is hopeful that the official opening ceremony may be arranged for May of 1978. If you feel you could spare an evening to help complete our Community Centre it would be very much appreciated. If only two or three helpers came along each evening, the project would be finished in not time at all. If you can lend a hand, there will deffinitely be some work going on, on a Monday and a Thursday evening. #### **ACTON TURVILLE PARISH COUNCIL**

**APRIL 2024 REPORT** 

<u>Flooding</u> – In an attempt to resolve the flooding reported last month in the vicinity of the railway bridge and railway approach, South Glos Council have inspected the drains and flushed them in order to remove an obstruction. The Parish Council will continue to monitor the area but it is hoped this will prevent the issue re-occurring

<u>Dog Fouling</u> – it is disappointing to note that dog fouling remains an issue in some parts of the village. The Parish Council have put up more signs to remind dog owners to act responsibly and clear up after their dogs.

<u>South Glos News</u> – at the Parish Council meeting in March, District Councillor Becky Romaine highlighted a number of actions being taken by the council in an attempt to reduce costs. These included introducing charges to council-owned car parks across South Glos, increasing the annual cost of green bin collections from £30 to £60, and requiring all visits to Sort-It Centres to be pre-booked in order to reduce delays at peak times. On a positive note, additional funding has been released to improve the condition of the local roads and address the large number of pot holes which have appeared over the winter months.

#### TEMPORARY FOOTPATH CLOSURE 1 APRIL – 22 MAY 2024

A signed diversion route outside of the Park will be available while the path is closed.

#### WESTink Latest

No sooner had Local Talk Back published a couple of articles on local bus services than one of them has announced a series of changes which will come into force on the 8<sup>th</sup> April. The one that's been tweaked is the on-demand *WEST*link service that you book to take you to any destination within a defined "zone". You might recall that our local villages were within quite a large zone that was bounded by the Bristol Channel in one direction and encompassed places like Keynsham and the Bath Park & Ride in the other. Well that's one of the bits that's changed. *WEST*link are keen for people to make shorter journeys, and rather than have a bus tied up travelling long distances with maybe just one passenger on board, they want them to be freed up to transport more passengers, ideally to a place where they can transfer onto scheduled bus and train services in order to complete their journey. Our "large zone" has therefore been transformed into a far smaller zone, now called Yate Rural. As you can see from the map, this roughly extends as far as the A38/M5 in one direction, and doesn't go much further than Westerleigh if you're heading the other way. On the plus side, those starting their journeys in the Yate Rural zone will still be able to travel to Thornbury via what they term a "shared zone". Similar zones will also allow journeys to Southmead Hospital, Parkway train station and UWE/MOD Abbey Wood sites which were not previously an option.

Changes are also being made to the booking system. From the 8<sup>th</sup> April, if you request a *WEST*link bus for a journey than can be made using a scheduled service (eg Badminton to Yate) your request will be declined and you'll be pointed towards the 41 service operated by Coachstyle.

Local Talk Back's experience of WESTlink was good in parts, but it was very evident that the buses were underutilised. Maybe these changes will help address that issue in particular. It's ironic though that the people we spoke to who did use the service on a regular basis were making journeys to Bitton and the Park & Ride at Bath, both of which are now outside "our" zone. So, what options will our Bitton-bound WESTlink -using friend have once these

changes are introduced? The journey on WESTlink currently takes about an hour, so let's use the handy Travelwest journey planner to find out what impact the changes will have. Well, if our friend is up early enough they can catch the 7.09am 95 service from Badminton to Chippenham (we'd not previously heard of the 95 service but it appears to run only during the school term time, making that one early stop at Badminton). 24 stops and 1 hour later, they can let the train take the strain from Chippenham to Bath Spa, from where they take the number 19 bus to Bitton. Total journey time, just over 2 hours. If a 7am start is too early, the next bus departs at 10.20am, takes 2 hours and 20 minutes, and involves three buses. Other options involve a combination of bus and train travel but the journey times are broadly comparable. Coming back is a similar story, with journeys taking between 2½ to 3 hours. We couldn't find how much the journey would cost, but if you're paying for each element as a separate journey, the costs will soon add up and quickly surpass the £2 each way that WESTlink will currently charge you.

Public transport will always have winners and losers, and we are particularly fortunate to have the 41 service which runs throughout the day between Yate and Malmesbury. *WEST*link was a new concept that was slowly finding favour with local residents, but on the occasions when we saw it pass through the village it was rare to see more than one or two passengers on it. Maybe it was inevitable that changes would be made, but many of the benefits appear to have been

#### THE VALENTINE CLUB - part two

The first year of the Valentine Club was very busy. It gave us all the things we had hoped for – interesting talks and demonstrations, lots of social gatherings, trips out and involved family and friends. We catered for the children, for the pensioners of the village and brought the wider community together for fundraising occasions.

We had a lot of fun and learned a lot of new things from interesting speakers. If we had put it all into practice we should have finished the year fit and healthy, well dressed and looking glamorous as we became perfect hostesses with amazing culinary skills. We could have made beautiful floral decorations for every occasion, then filled our 'spare' time with new hobbies of knitting, sewing and embroidery etc. But there was no time, next year's programme had to be planned!

The following years through the 80's became even busier as we took on charity fundraising. Our first project was to sponsor a Guide Dog for the Blind, committing to a target of £1,000. We were helped a lot by our President Lady Caroline, later the Duchess of Beaufort. Each year she helped our fundraising enormously by very kindly allowing us the use of her home and hosting wine and cheese parties for our members and friends. Many times we used the Ballroom at Badminton House for our fundraising events.

Tom and Gloria Gibson also opened their home and garden to us on many occasions, especially for the Summer Fetes. Gloria was Chairman of the club until she moved away to Bath.

It took several years to collect the sponsor money for a Guide Dog as we were also fundraising for the Christmas parties. One evening we had a visit from Mr Frost who had travelled all the way from Chester with his Guide Dog 'Marty'. Mr Frost was South West Regional Manager for Guide Dogs for the Blind. He talked about his training experience with his dog 'Marty' and his first dog 'Ambie'. It wasn't long after that we were able to hand over the £1,000 to the charity and we received a framed photograph of 'Petra', the Guide Dog we had sponsored.

Our next project was to redecorate the Jubilee room and kitchen of Badminton Hall and supply new curtains. We were helped along by the villagers who came to our funraising Bingo nights. Some of the ladies of our group helped with the decorating and found talent they didn't know they had and muscles they also didn't know they had. Several husbands helped with the more difficult decorations. We would have been lost without them.

We then heard that Stoke Park Hospital in Bristol was in need of funds for equipment for the young patients' and we decided to help. (Stoke Park Hospital used to be in the big House overlooking the M32 which incidentally, years earlier had belonged to the Beaufort family. The hospital closed in 1997)

An important and special meeting for the Valentine Club was to welcome 20 young patients from Stoke Park Hospital. The evening began with our President the Duchess of Beaufort presenting cheques to the value of £200 on our behalf. The evening continued with a sing-song followed by a buffet supper. The Valentine members interacted with the young people and everyone had a good time. Mr and Mrs Greenaway had joined us and Mrs Greenaway played the piano. Our next two charity fundraisers were for St Peter's Hospice and the Macmillan Nurses.

The bingos, skittle evenings, square dancing, fashion shows and wine and cheese parties etc were how we funded our charities and along with our outings were, for many of us, our social lives. We did have fun!

#### **Church Matters**

#### April 2024 Letter from the Vicar

#### Dear all,

I've been a Daily Telegraph Reader for probably 40 years now, and the other day I rang and discussed cancelling my subscription. The half-truths reported and articles against an institution I love, has really annoyed me.

The drum being beaten is threefold: The Church of England is guilty of 1) 'epistemic abuse' of government asylum policy, by holding industrial scale baptisms for asylum seekers; 2) giving £1 billion in reparations for slavery but ignore the financial issues of struggling parishes and 3) undermining the Government's plan to send refugees to Rwanda.

All this criticism is unjustified. There is no 'epistemic abuse' of the Asylum system. The Times newspaper investigated the former Home Secretary's claim and discovered that in 2022 there were just 26 Baptisms of Asylum seekers out of a total of something like 900,000! And 15 or so of those were rejected by the Home Office. The incoming Home Secretary admitted that there is no evidence of 'systemic abuse' of the system, as The Telegraph broadcasted.

The claim to give £1bn in slavery reparations is wrong. The church commissioners have agreed to give £10 million a year for the next ten years. That is it. The calls by some people to give £1bn would not be met by the Church Commissioners nor by congregations. Any funds would have to be raised.

Finally, Rwanda - As we all know, it is the role of the Upper Chamber to question, advise and sieve the government's bills, not to stop them. That Bishops point out our moral obligation to stay within international law, does not seem to be evidence of anything other than having a moral compass. That is surely the purpose of the Upper House?

These amplified criticisms really sadden me. And it worries me because people believe what they read. I just wish everyone who cared about the church, could read the Church Times which explains the true situation that lies behind these headlines.

Whether I go through with cancelling my subscription we will have to see. But please take what you read in the papers, with a bucket load of salt!

#### J J'S GARDENING BLOG



Let us look forward to spring flowers and no dramatic weather. There has already been a good show of daffodils, large and smaller ones. Herbaceous plants are also putting their noses above ground. Lots of promise of what is to come. But take care, the weather can have a sting in its tail. If you have put some pots out on a sunny spring day remember to fetch them in under cover at night. The hellebores have lasted in flower for a long time, if you didn't remove their scruffy leaves earlier, now is the time to do it, and it really tidies them up. Also make a note of ones you need to buy, and root out seedlings that are disappointing or you have too many of boringly coloured ones.

#### Here's an Idea

If you have an area that needs lightening up, perhaps think of euphorbia. Lots to choose from and easy to grow. But with a white sap which some people are allergic too, but a zingy colour. Camasias and fritilliaries will follow on.

#### Ready, Steady, Pot!

Plan what to put in your pots. Get your orders in. Support local nurseries who may have annuals in all of one colour available. In other words, not a mix of colours in one seed tray. Single colours can have more impact. But that is just a consideration! Do you need an evergreen to highlight something in front of it.

Wash flower pots, so you start the season disease free. Anything that needs keeping in shape, now is the time, and it really spruces things up.

#### And Finally

Mow the lawn and trim the edges. Buy some epimediums, from delicate ones to those about six to eight inches tall. Corydalis, lovely blue flowers, ferny foliage, light shade.

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


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
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### Picture Gallery
