ERITORIAL RECEMBER 2024

We are pleased to be guest writers for this month's editorial. No apologies for mentioning the weather as we are writing this in the middle of 'storm Bert', the second named storm of the season. And what a storm! So far we have heard of flooding in the villages of Acton Turville, Badminton, Burton, Sherston and Alderton with abandoned cars everywhere.

Chippenham town centre is flooded as is Malmsbury, and 100 houses near Yate also under water. This is probably the tip of the iceberg. Two inches of rain fell in just over 14 hours locally.

It has been terrible to watch on our TV screens the floods occurring in many parts of Spain. How can we comprehend rivers of water, some as high as 9ft, raging through streets and homes. It was also said that around 100,000 cars were piled up in streets or swept away with the water.

The 19th November brought the first snow of winter. How strange to see the trees in lovely autumn-coloured leaves with snow covered verges below.

We hear from gardeners that it's not been a good year for them as cold weather at crucial times stopped the germination process so many vegetables were later than usual. On the farms they battle with the weather as well. To germinate the plants it can't be too cold, rain is then needed to start the growing and dry weather is necessary for the harvesting. This with weather that's always unpredictable. The maize plants you see in the fields are grown for animal feed and the beans for protein for animal feed. If at any time the wheat harvest isn't good enough for bread and biscuits it goes for animal feed, as does the barley if it isn't good enough for malting. What a headache! It must mean that some years the animals get very well fed.



As preparations are underway for the Chrstmas festivities we thought we would look through the very old Badminton Parish magazines to see what they were up to back then. We only found two mentioning Christmas: 1914 and 1926.

In 1914 we were at war and the news was that four of our local soldiers from the 2nd Wilts battalion had met with disaster. One, William Ayliffe, had been wounded and brought back to England. The other three – Tom Ayliffe, Arthur Wearing and Arthur Viner (Sally's Grandfather) were prisoners in Germany. Collections had been made in the village to our boys at the front, to provide them with cigarettes and tobacco, their only little comfort.

Christmas 1926 was much happier. 'The Duchess of Beaufort gave a beautiful Christmas tree and a tea to all the children, everyone going away with a present to their great delight. On the day that the school broke up, the children gave themselves a tea party and Mr Littlewood and the teachers organised a very good singsong.' Thanks was given to all the parents who sent cakes and other food for the tea.

We have lots of memories of our time in the Valentine Club when we organised Christmas parties for the pensioners of our three villages. Through the year there was fund raising events especially Bingo sessions to pay for the party and entertainment. In one of our meetings we each made a floral decoration for the party tables. There would be shopping to do and a 'free' raffle to organise. On the morning of the party club members and some of the husbands would decorate the hall, lay the tables and prepare the hot lunch and afternoon tea. Behind the scenes on kitchen duties were many Valentine's husbands. We did this for 25 years and a good time was had by all.

DIDMARTON RURAL CINEMA IS CHANGING!

2024 was another very successful year for the Didmarton Rural Cinema, with the organisers once again presenting a varied programme of films which offered something for everyone. That successful formula is due to continue into 2025, but with some significant and exciting changes to the way the cinema operates.

The film nights are organised by the Didmarton Village Hall and Community Committee, who have to ensure the correct permits and licences are in place before any films can be shown. For 2025, the committee have decided to purchase a 'blanket' license for the year, which means they will be able to show any film, at any time, from any media, including DVD or streaming. However, under the terms of the new licence, the organisers will not be allowed to publicly advertise the name of the film they'll be showing, and will not be allowed to charge an entry fee. The solution is to relaunch the Didmarton Rural Cinema as the Didmarton Film Club. Membership of the club is free, and those who join will be sent details of forthcoming films each month. Members are allowed to bring guests to the film shows, which will continue to be held on the 2^{nd} Friday of each month at the Didmarton Village Hall, and whilst there will be no charge, all those attending are expected to make a donation (£5). The bar will run as usual.

REMEMBERING THE WOMEN'S INSTITUTE IN ACTON TURVILLE

Acton Turville W.I. was formed in November 1994. So many people helped us in those early days. Adrian Farrell, who was our local policeman, gave us instruction on Self Defence, Pat Downes showed us how to make Christmas wreaths and each Christmas we had great fun icing and decorating our cakes together in our kitchen. We went Carol Singing around the village for a number of years, maybe not very tunefully!! Judy Hallimond showed us how to make corn dollies, and we had a stall at the Chipping Sodbury Street Fayre each year, selling cakes, jams and chutneys, which helped to boost our finances!

One of the original concepts of the first W.I., formed in Canada, was education as well as friendship, and our group tried hard to follow this philosophy. One year we went gliding, does anyone else remember this? Another time we had an open meeting for Dr Alan Preece, Consultant Clinical scientist and Reader in Medical Physics from the Bristol Oncology Centre, who talked to us about the impact of mobile phones, electro-magnetic fields and non-ionising radiation. This was when people were very worried about the effects of micro-waves and towers of dishes over the countryside. On another occasion, Mrs Edith Nettles gave a most interesting insight into her life as the housekeeper at Badminton House. We had a number of talks on gardening, hanging baskets and flower arranging over the years, and on occasion we went home with examples of stage make up on our faces and hands. We made marzipan fruits, and heard all about antiques from Philip Taubenheim from Wotton Auction House. We sent teams to Portishead for the Annual Quizzes, not that we won anything, and we entered the Hawkesbury Show competition each year, again without much luck! But we did win the Ladies Team prize in the Fun Run, here in Acton Turville, in 1997.

When the village had a Bonfire Night each year, we served, with the help of our husbands, hot dogs, coffee, etc for everyone. We had a lot of fun over the years, but then activities were suspended in November 1999, as no one was prepared to be an officer on the Committee. June Gott and I had completed 5 years, which we had enjoyed, but without enough members to support any activities, it was no longer viable to continue. At that time our members were supporting the school, the church and us.

DECEMBER 2024 REPORT

<u>Current Actions:</u> Since last month's report, the Parish Council have received updates on two of the issues that we raised with our local District Councillors, namely the provision of bus stop signs in the village and the replacement of signs designed to warn drivers of a dangerous corner on the Old Sodbury Road (the so-called "Clump of Trees"). Councillor Becky Romaine confirmed that she had been in discussion with the relevant department in South Glos Council. They had already undertaken a site visit, but rather frustratingly had been unable to identify either of the precise locations! The Parish Council has therefore re-sent all the relevant information which will hopefully expedite matters. We have also raised concerns about the risk to pedestrians walking on the Burton road between the motorway bridge and Acton Turville where, for a long stretch, there is no pavement. Again, we will post updates when we receive them

<u>Traffic Issues</u>. The Parish Council welcomes the set of guidelines issued by Trinity School which are aimed at car users dropping off and collecting children from the school. We hope they will address some of the issues frequently raised with the Parish Council including inconsiderate parking and drivers leaving engines running when stationary.

<u>Police Update</u>. A reminder that our local PCSO Cheryl Dibble from Avon & Somerset Police will be visiting the village in the Community Police Van on the 10th December between 10.30am and 12.30pm in the Fox & Hounds car park. Our PCSO is always keen to chat with villagers about any issues and concerns you might have so why not go along and say hello?

BADMINTON MEMORIAL HALL - ACCOUNTS FOR YEAR 1926

This statement of accounts for the village hall was printed in the Badminton Parish magazine The value of \pounds 1 would be worth \pounds 76.60 today.

The dances made the most money for the hall and half as much again from dancing practices. The Rummage (Jumble) Sale made, the equivalent today of \pounds 1,149.

They were really lucky to have a cinema in the hall at that time.

'Tis the Season to be Planning

Before the weather gets too wet underfoot, it is a good moment to plan vistas. Paths will look longer and more distant if they become narrower as they recede. They also encourage one to walk boldly onward, whilst a curved path will encourage one to linger and notice things. Perhaps plant something at the end of the path, make a destination for the path. A wonderful coloured acer. What a show there has been of them at the roadside at Westonbirt.

Think Practical

So does the path need better drainage? Is it wide enough? Does this path have a wheelbarrow going up and down it? Local stone as a surface will always marry with the stone of the house. Gravel can be easy to lay, but needs weeding often and is an attractive colour. Hard wearing stone such as granite can be a bit gloomy, but if you are wanting a pattern using setts, it becomes charming. There are quite a few different coloured stones to choose from, one to avoid is white which looks like a memorial to me.

Think Tranquil

What garden furniture to choose, which immediately makes one want to linger? Where is it going to be stored?

Is this the time to add water? Perhaps at a place to linger with a seat and a cup of tea?

And Finally, Think Christmas
