EDITORIAL OCTOBER 2024

Have you ever visited Wot Not? It's a shop in Westerleigh where people bring items which are then sold on commission. If you're thinking of stocking up on expensive jewellery, exquisite antiques and collectable objet d'art, look elsewhere. Instead, imagine what it would be like if you extracted all those items lurking in the darkest corners of your shed, garage and loft, undisturbed for decades under a protective covering of dust and cobwebs, and stacked them on shelves and racking. Now you're getting closer.

A visit to Wot Not is always an experience. After a while you learn to filter out the wonky lkea coffee tables, seventies G-Plan display cabinets and piles of wonder-gadgets that people have bought from the shopping channel, only to quickly discover their life-changing capabilities may have been somewhat overstated. The remainder of the stock falls into two categories – useful and interesting. What makes Wot Not different is the rigorous, multi-stage assessment process that the majority of items will have gone through prior to arrival. First of all they'll have been deemed worthy of purchase by their original owners. Then over the years they have been repeatedly re-assessed during those regular spring cleans, decluttering exercises and house moves we all go through every so often, when somebody would have thought them too good to send to the tip and instead moved them to ever more remote corners of the loft/garage/shed/kitchen cupboard. Only the good stuff makes it to Wot Not.

Useful items are most likely to be discovered when you're looking for something specific to perform a particular task. Going in and wandering aimlessly around the piles of junk carefully-selected stock in the hope of finding something that might just come in useful sometime in the in the future is not recommended. Those who adopt that approach are most likely to end up with something that will sit unused in the loft/garage/shed/kitchen before being either sent to the tip or returned to Wot Not in the hope that someone else will be lured in by its potential (see later). But when you know what you want and realise the last time you saw one for sale was 20 years ago in Woolworths, there's a good chance you'll find one in Wot Not.

The interesting items can be a double-edged sword. As we get older, we increasingly focus on things that remind us of the past and provide us with that warm glow of nostalgia. Museums have recognised this - amongst the historical artefacts that have huge cultural significance you'll often find displays of relatively modern items like computers and household goods from the second half of the 20th century, showing just how much technology has changed our lives. While children stare at the displays, busily scribbling down notes for their school history project about life in the 1980s, people like me wonder why a museum is exhibiting modern things such as a ZX80 home computer like the one I bought from the local branch of Tandy in 1981 with my first pay packet, or that digital watch with the red LED display that would flatten the battery after barely half a dozen presses. The memories come flooding back, and I start thinking whether I've still got them spirited away somewhere in the loft/garage/shed/kitchen cupboard. Invariably a quick search reminds me that the ZX80 was sacrificed 30 years ago when the cassette drive broke, and instead we kept the fondue set which remains in a corner of the loft, unused and still in its original packaging. Life moves on and we get back to the day job

I last called into Wot Not on my way back from taking the fondue set to the Yate recycling centre. I was after something specific, but soon forgot about that as my eyes were drawn to 'interesting things'. That feeling of nostalgia that I experienced at the museum flooded back, only this time everything on display had a price. And it was cheap. First thing that caught my eye was a hi-fi system with more flashing lights, buttons and dials than the space shuttle. It was just like the one I remember my father had when I was growing up, and it was only £20. I was on the verge of buying it when I realised I no longer had and records or tapes to play on it. Close call. But I couldn't ignore the pile of Practical Motoring magazines from the 1960s. That was a pound well spent. Hours of fun would be had leafing through them. Or so I thought. They've now been in the back of the car for a month, and I have a nasty feeling they'll end up in the loft with all the other old books and magazines I've collected over the years. I kid myself that they're safely stored for a cosy evening of nostalgia when I'll finally sit down with a glass of port and enjoy looking through them, but in my heart of hearts I know they'll head to Wot Not to be palmed off to some other sad soul for £1.

I wish I could remember what it was I was looking for when I went down there. I'll have to go back. Maybe they've still got that hi-fi.

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Paul Jones - Village Agent Update

Help, support, and advice for residents of the Cotswold Edge area, which embraces the villages of Acton Turville, Badminton, Little Badminton, Hawkesbury Upton, Wickwar, Horton and Little Sodbury.

With summer over (well I think it is for me!) I've been reflecting on some of the issues that have surfaced recently and how I might be able to help. I've said before that in many instances the answers are 'online or use this link or download this App' but that doesn't work for everyone. I've set out below some information on help that is out there doesn't necessarily involve 'clicking'.

Avon Fire and Rescue -Requesting a Home Fire Safety Visit

I can make a referral to this service for a home fire safety visit. This is a free pre-arranged visit to your home to carry out a fire safety assessment and provide you with advice on how to stay safe from fire. This might be of interest if your or relatives have sight and/or hearing loss, mobility or memory issues or would be unable to escape unaided if there is a fire.

If you do have access to the Internet, you can self-refer at https://www.avonfire.gov.uk/safety/home/home-fire-safety/. If not give me a call and I can help.

Winter Fuel Payment and Pension Credit

There has been a lot of press recently about the lack of take up on Pension Credit. If you're aged 66 or over and meet certain eligibility criteria, you could receive a top up to your state pension and open up access to a range of other benefits including Winter Fuel Payment. South Gloucestershire Council are encouraging people to pop into the nearest One Stop Shop or call them on 0800 953 7778. Alternatively give me a call and I will see what I can do to help.

Helping people to access services online

I've been talking to Age UK and South Gloucestershire Council about how we can help people living in the Cotswold Edge area become more confident with using new technology and the internet. We have some ideas about how this can be done in group settings or on a one-to-one basis. Most importantly it would be helpful to know what you would value most – help with a smart phone, accessing the internet safely, using a tablet device? Recently a colleague helped someone to access Google Translate so she could talk to an old pen friend in France! Please give me a ring and let me know if this sort of help would be useful to you or your family.

I hope the information above is of use, please let me know if you have any comments about the Village Agent service or contact me if you need any further advice or help.

OCTOBER 2024 REPORT

Police Update. Our local PCSO Cheryl Dibble from Avon & Somerset Police attended the September Parish Council meeting and discussed a number of issues.

The Parish Council expressed concern about the spate of thefts of cars and a trailer from the village, as well as a recent incident of criminal damage. PCSO Dibble confirmed that investigations remain on-going and reiterated the advice that residents should take additional measures to secure their property. A resident also reported an issue with an aggressive dog.

The Community Police Van will continue to make regular visits to the village where residents will be able to discuss issues with PCSO Dibble and members of the local Police team. Dates and times will be posted on the Parish Notice Board, website and Acton Turville Connect Facebook page.

The Parish Council reported that speeding in the village remains a concern with regular reports of vehicles travelling at excessive speed. Police presence was requested for two sites in particular, namely Littleton Drew Lane by the School and Badminton Road near the railway bridge.

Community Speed Watch. Volunteers are still required to support the local Community Speed Watch team. Can you spare some time to help? Please email the Clerk who will forward your details to the local co-ordinator.

Village Tidy Up. The next event will be on Saturday 12th October, meeting at the Fox & Hounds car park from 10am. As well as picking litter and tidying the planted areas, it's hoped there'll be enough volunteers to clean the equipment in the play area. Come along and join in the fun!


LOCAL AUTHOR TALK

Days Out - The Malvern Autumn Show

Head up the M5 and in no time you'll see the signs to the spa town of Malvern. Nestling in the shadow of the Malvern Hills, the town boomed in Victorian times when the health-giving properties of the local spring water attracted huge numbers of visitors. Malvern expanded rapidly to capitalise on its new-found status, building hotels, health spas and a grand theatre to cater for the influx of visitors, many of whom arrived at the newly-opened railway station. At its peak, famous names such as Charles Darwin and Florence Nightingale as well as members of the Royal Family visited the town, but the healing powers of the spa weren't reserved for the aristocracy, with workers from the Black Country and beyond all keen to experience them.

The popularity of hydrotherapy declined towards the end of the 19th century, but with its excellent transport links and stunning views from the Malvern hills, the town remained a popular tourist destination. However, Malvern needed to diversify if it was to retain its prosperous status. One solution was to repurpose some of the large buildings and convert them into private schools, with pupils arriving daily from adjacent towns and cities by coach and train. Later on, it established itself as a hub for scientific research, leading on the development of modern radar systems in the post-war years and, more recently, being at the forefront of the fight against cyber crime.

Throughout this time, its main industry has been agriculture, and visitors to the town can't fail to notice the huge 90-acre showground, owned by the Three Counties Agricultural Society,

which lies on the outskirts. The showground hosts events throughout the year - in May there's the RHS Spring Show with its show gardens, massive displays of plants and flowers and plenty of shopping opportunities. The Three Counties Show in June retains very much an agricultural flavour with livestock and rare breeds competing to win coveted awards, then in September it's back to the garden theme for the Autumn show. With the evenings drawing in and the leaves starting to fall from the trees, Talk Back decided to get out and about to see what the Autumn Show had to offer.

Arriving just after 10am, there was a healthy queue of eager visitors snaking its way to the main entrance, but it moved quickly and we were soon inside the showground. To say there was lots to see was a bit of an understatement. Although the focus is very much on anything (and everything) gardening-related, with much of the centre of the showground given over to plant sales, there was plenty more dotted around the site to enjoy.

A different kind of plant. There were large displays of agricultural vehicles and implements including this rather tidy mini-tractor manufactured by Ransomes after the war. Available with a wide range of accessories, it was advertised as "performing the work of a team of horses."

The imminent arrival of winter didn't deter the keen shoppers, and people were stocking up on all sorts of things from bulbs to shrubs and what looked like quite mature trees. I risked £5 on a bag of bulbs. Other visitors seemed to be happy to spend more, and we watched one gentleman selecting a trio of olive trees at £750 each. Maybe he was going to run his car on olive oil. For those less inclined to have the responsibility of keeping expensive plants alive there was lots of choice. Popular product this year seemed to be

flowers and plants handcrafted in metal and stuck on the end of a long spike, which made for some interesting near-misses as people struggled to carry them around the showground.

For some nurseries and growers, Malvern is about more than selling plants. They come to win prizes and put on displays in the main marquees which they hope will earn them a coveted Gold medal. The quality of the displays in the floral and produce marquees were indeed outstanding, with the winners proudly displaying their certificates of achievement for presenting the perfect blooms and produce. I'm not sure what the purists made of the produce in one of the other marquees though, where size was everything and form took a very distant second place. Welcome to the inspiringly-titled Giant Vegetable Marquee, which was something of an eye-opener. Competition was fierce with awards including the biggest radish, the heaviest runner bean and the longest turnip (which this year set a new world record at 4929mm), but you suspected that something stronger than Miracle Grow was being used to achieve such standards.

By mid-afternoon we would probably have benefited from a glass or two of Miracle Grow ourselves, so we began to make our way back. After a tour of the food hall, the craft tent and the antique stalls we decided to call it a day, and with dark clouds rolling in from the hills, we made a break for the car park and headed home. We thoroughly enjoyed our day in Malvern and would recommend it to anyone. As you'll see from the pictures, it was about far more than gardening, and there really is something for everyone. J J'S GARDENING BLOG

There are a few plants still flowering, such as the lime green nicotianas, which go well with any blue flowers, and alstromerias in various colours which as well as flowering for several months are good for cutting and using in arrangements.

Planting Ideas

What to do with something for pots? There are plenty of heathers available and bulbs too. For some added interest, place some crocus amongst the heathers. Shallow containers/pans can host a variety of succulents. Japanese anemones in pink or white with a green eye are still flowering too. Make a note of plants you fancy as a record of what you would like to buy for next year. What about planting something with lovely berries? Lots of choice in the Sorbus genus. Put one on your Christmas list.

Jobs for This Month

Either dead head and tidy up leaving lots of plant still available for insects etc to live in over the winter, or be very tidy, cut everything down and dress with compost. With the second choice, there is more chance that some plants will not survive because they have no protection. But hey ho, this leaves a space for another different plant. Off to the garden centre. A nursery locally which has some lovely plants and particularly ones for a conservatory is at Brinkworth, The Walled Garden.

And Finally

If you can find some hydrangea heads that are perfect, possibly hiding underneath, it is worth drying them. Some will do so easily, some will not. No water needed, just put them in a dry vase inside and in a darkish place. Come December you can jazz them up with spray paint and glitter.



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
